and Incredibly Close, was published in 2005. Set in New York City, it revolves around events since September 11, 2001. Foer lives in Brooklyn, New York City.

New York City, September 10th, 2001. Bedtime. Nineyear-old Oskar, the narrator, has just asked his father to tell him a story.
